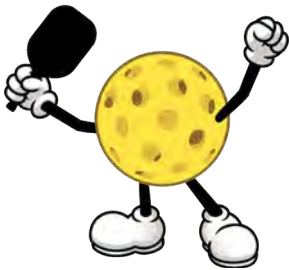

PARKS AND RECREATION

Come out to the park and try your hand at pickleball!



Honey Brook Borough Council transformed the old, deteriorating tennis courts into four brand new pickleball courts.

The courts in the borough park are open from dawn to dusk. If you're new to the game, we highly recommend taking a few beginner lessons to get started. Next Level Indoor Sports in Chester Springs offers these lessons for \$35 and provides you with the necessary equipment. Check their website for more information - www.nextlevelindoorsports.com. You can also visit www.usapickleball.org for the rules or purchase a book like Pickleball for Dummies.

An active group of local players regularly play on the Borough courts. They use the Team Reach App to connect with other players and organize play times. The group is open to everyone. To become part of this pickleball community, download the Team Reach App from the app store, enter the group code 'hbpickleball', and create a username and password. Once in the app, you can join the group chat and sign up to attend one of the organized play times. Sixteen players can play on the four courts at one time, so it is essential that during organized play, they know how many people to expect. Please note that Team Reach is not a Borough sponsored program. It is a platform where individuals can find others interested in playing pickleball. Play is often organized but remains open to all including walk-up players. Join in! During organized play, the paddle rack is used to keep track of who plays next. The paddle rack is mounted on the outside fence. Put your paddle in the next open spot on the rack. Once your racket is next in line, it is your turn. Organized play is scheduled for Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and Tuesday and Thursday from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. At all other times, it is first come, first serve. Please limit your play time to 1.5 hours if others are waiting.

HONEY BROOK FOOD PANTRY

Despite an increase in need of 45% over the past 24 months, the HBFP continues to see more families requesting assistance than ever before. Halloween is a fun, and spooky, time of year for kids. Make trick-or-treating safe for your little monsters with a few safety tips.

HALLOWEEN FIRE SAFETY TIPS

- ➔ **When choosing a costume**, stay away from billowing or long trailing fabric. If your child is wearing a mask, make sure the eye holes are large enough so they can see out.
- ➔ **Provide children** with flashlights to carry for lighting or glow sticks as part of their costume.
- ➔ Dried flowers, cornstalks and crepe paper are highly flammable. **Keep** these and other decorations well away from all open flames and heat sources, including light bulbs and heaters.
- ➔ **It is safest to use** a flashlight or battery-operated candle in a jack-o-lantern. If you use a real candle, use extreme caution. Make sure children are watched at all time when candles are lit. When lighting candles inside jack-o-lanterns, use long, fireplace-style matches or a utility lighter. Be sure to place lit pumpkins well away from anything that can burn and far enough out of the way of trick-or-treaters, doorsteps, walkways and yards..
- ➔ **Remember** to keep exits clear of decorations so nothing blocks escape routes.
- ➔ **Tell children** to stay away from open flames. Be sure they know how to stop, drop and roll if their clothing catches fire. (Have them practice, stopping immediately, dropping to the ground, covering their face with their hands, and rolling over and over to put the flames out.)

Use flashlights as alternatives to candles or torch lights when decorating walkways and yards. They are much safer for trick-or-treaters, whose costumes may brush against the lighting.

If your children are going to Halloween parties at others' homes, have them look for ways out of the home and plan how they would get out in an emergency.

Decorations are the first thing to ignite in 1,000 reported home fires each year.

DID YOU KNOW....

Things That Make You Go Hmmm...

Wi-Fi is not an acronym for anything. A common belief is that Wi-Fi actually stands for Wireless Fidelity. However, there are no official recorded documents to support this notion. The technical name given to the wireless technology standard IEEE 802.11b was simplified with the coining of the term Wi-Fi. The name Wi-Fi has been used in the tech space ever since the Wi-Fi Alliance of 1998.

Before the advent of Wi-Fi, the spectrum of radio frequencies used by Wi-Fi were referred to by some as “the garbage bands”—for being largely useless. In addition to Wi-Fi, technologies that use radio frequencies to send signals between devices include walkie-talkies, car radios, cell phones, and weather radios.

While the built-in antenna in some compact routers might offer spherical coverage, most of the routers with external antenna deliver doughnut-

shaped coverage around them. So, if you expect the best coverage throughout the circumference of your house, you should choose a central location for the router for the best Wi-Fi performance.

Because Wi-Fi uses radio waves that are around the same frequency as those used in a microwave, people with older microwaves can experience Wi-Fi interference while using their appliance.

The first company to promote Wi-Fi was Apple Computers, who included a Wi-Fi airport option on their 1999 iBooks.

Hackers can attack a user’s data on an open Wi-Fi network in less than two seconds. According to one study, 75% of people predicted that a week without access to Wi-Fi would leave them grumpier than if they went a week without coffee.

In the tiny town of Green Bank, Virginia, Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, and mobile connections are all outlawed, due to the presence of a high-tech government telescope nearby. The town is home to the Green Bank Telescope, the largest steerable radio telescope in the world. Scientists at the telescope use radio energy from light-years away to study the formation of stars and galaxies. A rogue radio signal could disrupt their research and impede potential discoveries that could provide answers to major questions about the universe.

Winter Holiday Safety

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.



HOLIDAY DECORATING

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.



HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.



Before Heading Out or to Bed

Blow out lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed. **Turn off** all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

- ! More than **one-third** of home decoration fires are started by candles.
- ! More than **two of every five** decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source.

PUBLIC WORKS



If you see an issue on the streets, please call the Borough Office and leave a message with your name, address, and phone number.

Please check to see if you have trees or shrubs hanging out over the roadway as this can cause damage to equipment, passing vehicles and cause sight distance issues for vehicles trying to pull out from stop signs onto busy roads. Trees and shrubs should be a minimum of 2 feet off the roadway. Also keep in mind trees with snow on them will hang out further and lower than normal.

Check your mailbox to ensure it is not hanging over the road or curb. The Borough is not responsible for mailboxes that are damaged due to road maintenance and snow removal.

Do not place trash bags or recycling containers on the street, they should be placed on the sidewalk or curb, away from vehicle traffic. If a recycling container is damaged it is the responsibility of the resident to have it replaced. Official Honey Brook Borough green trash bags can be purchased at the following locations for \$7.00 – Borough Hall (cash only), Honey Brook Express Gas (Route 10), Eby’s Market, and Honey Brook Hardware.



Fall is approaching... which means the leaves will be falling. When cleaning up leaves do not sweep or rake them into the street. Leaves can be put in brown biodegradable bags and set at your curb on the 3rd Wednesday of the month from April through November at no cost to the homeowner.



Winter is coming... remember to move your cars off the streets when a snow emergency is declared. When 3 or more inches of snow or an ice storm is predicted, a snow emergency will be declared. Check the Borough website, or sign up at ReadyChesco.org for snow emergency alerts.

on Winter Fires

Home fires occur more in winter than in any other season. As you stay cozy and warm this winter, be fire smart!



Half of all home heating fires occur in December, January and February.



Heating equipment is involved in **1 in every 7** home fires and **1 in every 5** home fire deaths.



Keep anything that can burn **at least 3 feet** from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators or space heaters.



Keep portable generators **outside, away from windows, and as far away** from your home as possible.



Install and test carbon monoxide alarms **at least once a month**.



Plug only **1 heat-producing appliance** (like a space heater) into an electrical outlet at a time.



Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents **every year**.



Store cooled ashes in a tightly covered metal container, and keep it **outside at least 10 feet** from your home and any nearby buildings.

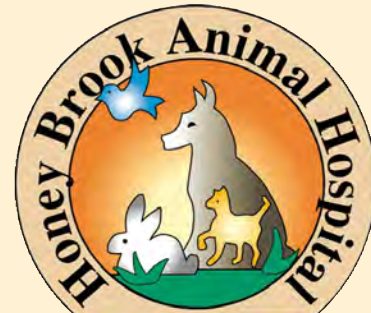
