Honey Brook Food Pantry

Pantry News from the Board Chairman:

The financial stress placed on segments of the local population, food supply disruptions and dramatic shifts in attendance continue to have a significant impact on our operation at the Honey Brook Food Pantry.

We have increased Friday distributions by taking food into the community and ramped up our service for emergency needs “on demand”. For example, during the past week we provided emergency food to a senior undergoing dialysis while her husband was hospitalized. We also purchased and delivered a unique infant formula to a young mother who had exhausted her WIC benefits and would have been unable to feed her two-month-old overnight.

We are maintaining all possible special programs including the Infant-Age 3 Supplemental Nutrition Program, employment support, Garden for Life, Anchored Ministries Clothing Closet, benefit updates and are providing Kids’ Bags for every child. We look forward to partially returning inside soon and re-starting the Taste-It Program, individual health testing and education, financial advising, dental referral services and the free market.

- During the first six weeks of our “closed economy”, 450 Families were served, encompassing 1,545 people through.....a 48% increase, including the largest distribution ever (506 people).
- Since the outset of the pandemic, newly registered families, each with its own individual story, have increased by 82%. During the past quarter alone, we served 127 new people.
- By maximizing all available short-term public food sources and through your great financial support, our nutritious food offering has increased over 30% since the onset of the virus.

AND SOME GREAT NEWS....OUR ANNUAL SURVEY OF FAMILIES LEAVING THE PANTRY IN 2020 YIELDED THE BEST RESULTS EVER—OVER 40% ACHIEVED FOOD SUFFICIENCY THROUGH EMPLOYMENT AND/OR ADEQUATE INCOME/SAVINGS.

The community response to our efforts has been outstanding and our tremendous volunteer team continues to be the backbone of the organization, working safely under extremely challenging conditions. The people we serve deeply appreciate your time and generosity.

Some difficult days may lie ahead.....yet because of our volunteers, our supporters and our friends, the Honey Brook Food Pantry is well prepared to do whatever is needed to address food insufficiency in the area. The community can be **100% confident** that we will be there week in and week out with a great supply of healthy food whenever it is needed.

The Honey Brook Fire Company is a 100% volunteer company relying solely on volunteer staff to provide 24/7 coverage to the community. The Fire Company is always seeking new volunteers in all capacities – Firefighters, Fire Police, Junior Firefighters and Administrative Volunteers. Fire Company Safety Reminders

The officers and members of the Honey Brook Fire Company hope that all Honey Brook residents had a wonderful and safe summer. The fall season is upon us and winter is fast approaching. We would like to remind residents of some fall and winter fire safety tips.

HEATING SAFETY TIPS:

- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment like furnaces, wood stoves or portable space heaters.
- Have a three foot "Kid-Free Zone" around open fires or space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the correct kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure your fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the ash container a safe distance from your home.
- Test smoke detectors once per month.
- Test carbon monoxide detectors regularly and check expiration dates.

Smoke Alarms

SMOKE ALARMS SAVE LIVES! Smoke alarms that are properly installed and maintained play a vital role in reducing fire deaths and injuries. If there is a fire in your home, smoke spreads fast and you need smoke alarms to give you time to get out.

HERE'S WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW!

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire. Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home.
- Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one sound, they all sound.



- Large homes may need extra smoke detectors.
- Test your smoke alarms at least once per month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- When a smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside!
- Replace all smoke alarms in your home every 10 years.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

CODES ENFORCEMENT

The Borough would like to welcome Kraft Codes Services as our new Zoning and Codes Service for the Borough. Please call the Borough Office for all inspections, zoning and building services.

With winter approaching please remember it is the responsibility of all residents to clear their sidewalks of snow. Do not shovel or plow snow from your sidewalk or driveway into the street; and it is best to plow your driveway after the Borough has plowed your street in order to keep your driveway free from snow.



Recreational firepits are permitted in the Borough. All rules and regulations according to Borough Code of Ordinances 7-105 MUST be followed. You can find the Borough Code of Ordinances at our website on the Codes Enforcement page.

As a reminder... burning of leaves and other yard waste materials is not permitted.

How Can You Help?

The Stormwater-Friendly Lawn

The following lawn-care steps will help to protect local streams and rivers and may result in cost savings for homeowners:

- Set your mower height to 3 inches or higher. Taller grass slows the runoff and produces a deeper and denser root system, which absorbs more water and prevents erosion. Deeper roots also reduce the need for watering during droughts and suppress weeds from growing up around them.
- Keep grass clippings and chopped leaves on your property. A mulch-mower is ideal for retaining and spreading clippings on your lawn. The clippings decompose quickly, provide important nutrients for your lawn, and settle to create an organic layer on the soil that encourages stormwater infiltration. Using this mulch may also reduce or eliminate the need for nitrogen fertilizers. If mulching with your clippings is not possible, bag and store them in a compost area and then use the organic material that's created as a fertilizer later.
- Figure out if you really need to fertilize your lawn. There are no one-size-fits-all guidelines when it comes to fertilizer. Foregoing fertilizer is ideal for the health of local waterways and ecosystems. However, if your lawn is thin or has bare spots, you may not have a choice since a dense, vegetated cover is the most stormwater-friendly lawn. The soil texture, pH and nutrient levels are critical for a healthy lawn. Soil tests will reveal what your lawn may be suffering from. "micronutrient deficiency," is a problem that standard chemical fertilizers may not alleviate. So, identifying your lawn's needs first will reduce unnecessary applications, create a healthier lawn faster, and reduce your long-term costs.
- If fertilizer is needed, Homeowners should wait until the grass begins growing in March to fertilize and then stop fertilizing after October. Fertilizing during a lawn's dormant season increases the risk that the chemicals will run off into streams or leach into the water table because the root systems are less active. Maximize the benefits of slow-release nitrogen and minimize the number of chemical applications. Typically called "water insoluble nitrogen," or WIN, on fertilizer bags, slow-release nitrogen limits nutrient runoff and exportation. This type of fertilizer should be applied to your lawn in the spring, instead of the fall, to provide a steady source of nutrients throughout the growing season.
- Do not fertilize or use pesticides within 15 to 20 feet of a stream. Keeping this distance will help keep chemicals out of waterways. Also, if you live near a stream, consider establishing a natural riparian buffer there instead. Further articles, will address this practice. Also, when you're done applying fertilizer, immediately sweep any granulated chemicals off hard surfaces and back onto your lawn. Your walkway, driveway, patio, or local road is often a quick route to the drainage pipes that discharge into local streams.



PUBLIC WORKS

Please check to see if you have trees or shrubs hanging out over the roadway as this can cause damage to equipment, passing vehicles and also cause sight distance issues for vehicles trying to pull out from stop signs onto busy roads. Trees and shrubs should be a minimum of 2 feet off of the roadway. Also keep in mind trees with snow on them will hang out further and lower than normal.

Check your mailbox to ensure it is not hanging over the road or curb. The Borough is not responsible for mailboxes that are damaged due to road maintenance and snow removal.

Do not place trash bags or recycling containers on the street, they should be placed on the sidewalk or curb away from vehicle traffic. If a recycling container is damaged it is the responsibility of the resident to have it replaced.

Green trash bags can be purchased at the following locations for \$2.00 – Borough Hall (cash only), Honey Brook Express Gas (Route 10), Honey Brook Hardware, Eby's Market.

Fall is approaching... which means the leaves will be falling. When cleaning up leaves do not sweep or rake them into the street. Leaves can be put in brown biodegradable bags and set at your curb on the 3rd Wednesday of the month from April through November at no cost to the homeowner.

Winter is coming... remember to move your cars off the streets when a snow emergency is declared. When 3 or more inches of snow or an ice storm is predicted a snow emergency will be declared. Check the Borough website, or sign up at ReadyChesCO.org for snow emergency alerts.

Please remember... by Borough Code you have 24 hours after a snow or ice storm to clean your sidewalk.

Nurturing Natural Bird Food in the Cold Seasons

Birdfeeding is enjoyed by millions of people across the country and by many in Honey Brook Borough. Seeing a variety of birds close to our windows, especially in winter, provides hours of viewing pleasure. But there are ways to go beyond simple birdfeeding while providing natural food and protection during the winter. Here are two:

1. Stop cleaning up: A landscape that contains leaf litter, spent perennials and other “dead” elements actually host countless overwintering insects (including pupating caterpillars!) that will eventually feed the birds. Entomologist Doug Tallamy writes, “The easiest way to preserve over-wintering insect populations is to relax our neatnik standards whenever possible.” That’s good news for many of us!
2. Plant native fruiting shrubs and seed producing trees which will provide cover and a food source into late fall and winter: Chokeberry, winterberry holly, dogwood, pines and birch are good choices.

Instead of being down time, fall and winter can be viewed as an integral part of nature’s yearly cycle and your backyard can play a part. Author Sara Stein may have put it best in Noah’s Garden(© 1993):

By thanksgiving it will seem as though the clock (has) wound down and stopped. But the pendulum has in fact reached the height of its swing, has stored more energy than at any other time of the year, and is poised to descend with all the gathered momentum of warm summer days downward through the cold to spring.

So despite a seemingly lifeless backyard, winter can be one of the most active times for birds looking for refuge in your private sanctuary.

WATER NEWS

The Honey Brook Borough Authority would like to remind everyone that winter is on its way. Good rules to follow for every winter is to always winterize your home. Water pipes have a greater potential to freeze if water isn't running through them regularly. We recommend keeping your building's temperature at the minimum of 50-55 degrees to keep your indoor plumbing from freezing. We suggest shutting off the main water valve to your property if it will be unattended throughout the winter months. Disconnect and remove your garden hoses from your outside spigots, since freezing temperatures could cause the water in your garden hose to expand and could cause damage to your indoor plumbing. Indoor plumbing damage could cause your water pipes to burst resulting in interior damage. Winterizing your home is a great way to prevent any future emergencies. Want any tips? Just a reminder to always keep your home leak-free by repairing dripping faucets or shower heads and toilet flappers. Fixing these easily corrected household water leaks can save you hundreds of \$\$\$\$. Please contact our office at (610) 273-7830 with any questions or concerns.

DID YOU KNOW?

Our Water System has four ground water wells that pump an average of 150,000 to 200,000 gallons of water a day. Our well on Suplee Road has a filtration plant that houses five large filters that are designed to remove Iron and Manganese from our water!

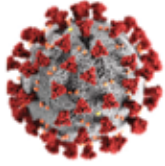

What you should know about COVID-19 to protect yourself and others



Know about COVID-19

- Coronavirus (COVID-19) is an illness caused by a virus that can spread from person to person.
- The virus that causes COVID-19 is a new coronavirus that has spread throughout the world.
- COVID-19 symptoms can range from mild (or no symptoms) to severe illness.



Know how COVID-19 is spread

- You can become infected by coming into close contact (about 6 feet or two arm lengths) with a person who has COVID-19. COVID-19 is primarily spread from person to person.
- You can become infected from respiratory droplets when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks.
- You may also be able to get it by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it, and then by touching your mouth, nose, or eyes.



Protect yourself and others from COVID-19

- There is currently no vaccine to protect against COVID-19. The best way to protect yourself is to avoid being exposed to the virus that causes COVID-19.
- Stay home as much as possible and avoid close contact with others.
- Wear a cloth face covering that covers your nose and mouth in public settings.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.



Practice social distancing

- Buy groceries and medicine, go to the doctor, and complete banking activities online when possible.
- If you must go in person, stay at least 6 feet away from others and disinfect items you must touch.
- Get deliveries and takeout, and limit in-person contact as much as possible.



Prevent the spread of COVID-19 if you are sick

- Stay home if you are sick, except to get medical care.
- Avoid public transportation, ride-sharing, or taxis.
- Separate yourself from other people and pets in your home.
- There is no specific treatment for COVID-19, but you can seek medical care to help relieve your symptoms.
- If you need medical attention, call ahead.



Know your risk for severe illness

- Everyone is at risk of getting COVID-19.
- Older adults and people of any age who have serious underlying medical conditions may be at higher risk for more severe illness.
